

Message From The Chair

After the first months of pandemic uncertainly, 2022 became a year full of possibilities. We can certainly reflect with great satisfaction on all that was achieved by the South African Holocaust & Genocide Foundation (SAHGF), the association of the three Holocaust & Genocide Centres in Cape Town, Durban and Johannesburg, which I am honoured to Chair.

The dedicated teams at the three Centres, including professional staff and volunteers, offered diverse in-Centre and Online programmes which included commemorations, webinars, school workshops and other educational offerings. We interacted with tens of thousands of learners, educators, university students and members of the public. We were also delighted to be able to host successful hybrid programming and to partner with many national and international organisations offering world class events.

Some of the highlights of 2022 included our annual commemorations. On the 27 January, still online, we held the <u>77th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz</u>,

International Holocaust Remembrance Day, together with the United Nations Information Centre (UNIC). At the Johannesburg Holocaust & Genocide Centre (JHGC) we opened the exhibition "In the Country of Numbers, where the men have no names", with keynote address by Dr Astrid Ley, Deputy Director of Sachsenhausen Memorial and Museum. The exhibition travelled to the Durban

Holocaust & Genocide Centre in November to mark the 1938 November Pogrom (Kristallnacht) and Dr Ley offered in-Centre talks and workshops in all three Centres that month. The Exhibition is travelling to the Cape Town Centre next. On 9 November the SAHGF partnered with the Goethe-Institut and the Rosa-LuxemburgStiftung (RLS) to commemorate the 1938 November Pogrom (Kristallnacht). The hybrid event included candle lighting by Holocaust survivor Irene Fainman and keynote addresses from US Special Envoy for Monitoring and Combating Antisemitism, Ambassador Deborah Lipstadt as well as from Professor Christopher Browning.

On 13 November the JHGC opened the world acclaimed exhibition "Seeing Auschwitz" which will be hosted by the SAHGF until the end of 2023. Each Centre will showcase the exhibition and accompanying events for four months. The exhibition was brought to South Africa in partnership with the Embassies of Germany, Austria, Poland and Israel and with the generous support of RLS, the Victor Dietz Foundation and the Beare Foundation. The world acclaimed exhibition was created by Musealia in partnership with the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum, and in collaboration with the UN and UNESCO. Do not miss visiting this extraordinary exhibition when it comes to your city!

I would like to thank all the three Centres' generous donors, volunteers, trustees and friends, whose belief in the importance of our work to remember, educate and learn lessons from the past, keeps us going!

Education

The JHGC education team has had a busy year with schools eager to visit the Centre and engage with the exhibition spaces and education programmes in person. We had the opportunity of working with director and producer of the award winning film 'I am Here' on the life of Holocaust survivor Ella Blumenthal, and the conversations with learners and students that followed touched on memory, forgiveness, courage and resilience.

The Centre piloted an education programme in partnership with USC Shoah Foundation's Dimensions in Testimony (DiT) which gave learners the opportunity to have a conversational experience with Holocaust survivor Pinchas Gutter through his interactive, online biography.


The JHGC reached a wide audience through international partnerships and online teaching opportunities such as a course 'Virtual Studies in Memory and Trauma' offered to students from Kyushu, Macao and Ningbo (Nottingham) universities in partnership with Yad Vashem.

Continuing to support South African educators, the JHGC ran many Holocaust and Genocide Educator Workshops and Enrichment Programmes to expand knowledge and share new methodologies.

Change Makers Programme and Conferences

The Johannesburg Holocaust & Genocide Centre in partnership with Education Africa and the generous support of the Meridian International Centre for Global Leaders, held a 3-day Change Makers Programme (CMP) training with educators from the Johannesburg South District. The training focused on learning from history's difficult past through case studies of the Holocaust, the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda and Apartheid in South Africa in order to promote pluralism and democracy and counter extremism.

Since the CMP's official launch in 2017, it had a very positive evaluation comments from participants in many countries in Africa. In response to this interest, the JHGC held a 4-day conference in December that brought CMP organisers from seven African countries together. We are grateful to the University of Leeds (AHRC), the Salzburg Global Seminar and the Contested Histories Institute for their partnership and support in this process.

In December, thanks to the generous support of RLS, the Centre also hosted the Global Bigotry and Hate Consortium with participants from seven countries.



Temporary Exhibitions

The Centre hosted four artists' exhibitions, educating about Genocide through a creative lens: "The Day I Became Another Genocide Victim", Barry Salzman's powerful collection of images from a mass grave site in Rwanda; "Heartsounds", Dr Jennifer Kopping's intricate mixed media works exploring memory and her family's diasporic journey; "Silhouettes in a Lullaby", Dr Nava T. Barazani's collection of works influenced by her mother's memories from the Giado camp in Libya during WWII; and Finnish artist Tuomo Manninen's photographs reflecting on Cambodia and Myanmar.

The JHGC is ending the year on a high note with the opening of "Seeing Auschwitz", an exhibition that critically analyses the photographic evidence of this notorious site. "Seeing Auschwitz" will be on display until the start of April 2023 and booking for guided tours or workshops can be made by contacting down@jhbholocaust.co.za






Below: Commemoration of the 1994 Genocide in Rwanda, Kwibuka28, with Keynote by Barry Salzman



Hosting Special Events


The JHGC has had the privilege to host in its different spaces impactful workshops, meetings, conferences, book launches and exhibitions.
