MAY

May was an action-packed month. The JHGC was full of visitors to exhibitions, events, and educational programmes.

The month started with the opening of a new exhibition in collaboration with the Sylt Foundation, Elias Mendel's **Letters to Yesterday**. The exhibition examined Mendel's German Jewish history through his interventions in an extensive family archive.

One of our most attended events was the book launch of Jonny Steinberg's newest book, *Winnie and Nelson*, in collaboration with Jonathan Ball Publishers. Another highlight included launching another fascinating and meaningful book, *I am Ella*, about Ella Blumenthal - a 102 year old Cape Town based Holocaust survivor.As part of our range of programmes, we hosted film screenings, including *Reckonings*, a film that explores the formation of the Claims Conference. During May, ,we collaborated on a number of webinars, including a special GFH Talking Memory programme marking the 80th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising.

In May, our education team welcomed over 20 schools and adult groups to the JHGC. In addition to our regular school education programmes, we were able to use Elias Mendel's exhibition as an opportunity to share his art and creative process with grade 11 learners from the National School of the Arts.

In the middle of the month, the JHGC facilitated an Educator Training Workshop in Bloemfontein which included teachers from across the Free State, supported by The Claims Conference. The workshop aimed to expand participants' knowledge of the Holocaust, genocide and human rights, and help them develop new methodologies for engaging and challenging their learners.

The JHGC's Education department continued working and building relationships with international partners in the genocide education and human rights sectors including the African and Middle East Leadership project (AMEL).The JHGC ran workshops as part of their curriculum with the goal of building resilient, inclusive societies that are free from discrimination, persecution, and violent coercion. The online and interactive workshop introduced the history of the Holocaust with a focus on the choices made by individuals and institutions in order to better understand the consequences, apathy, indifference and silence while encouraging pluralism, and active citizenship.

JUNE

June welcomed the opening of a returning exhibition to the JHGC, Eva's

Story: The Promise. The exhibition explored the story of Holocaust survivor Eva Schloss, her brother Heinz and his artwork. Born in Vienna in 1929, Eva's family fled after the Anschluss to Holland and after it too was occupied, went into hiding. During his time in hiding, Heinz quelled his fears by painting and writing poetry. They were all betrayed and deported to Auschwitz. Eva and her mother survived but her father and brother were killed just weeks before liberation.



June also saw a number of in person and online public events. We hosted Pedro Tabensky, founding director of the Allan Gray Centre for Leadership Ethics and professor at Rhodes University, who discussed ethics and education as practices of freedom. Online highlights of the month included a collaboration with Ghetto Fighter's House looking at the Iasi Pogrom in Romania, with Lyonell Fliss, a Johannesburg survivor discussing his childhood experiences of the pogrom.

A number of schools and university groups visited the Centre in June, including MBA students from GIBS. Learners from Maru-a-Pula in Botswana, travelled all the way to Johannesburg to attend a workshop exploring genocide in the 20th century through the two case studies of the Holocaust and the 1994 Genocide in Rwanda. They were joined by survivor Irene Klass who shared her experiences of the Holocaust.

ARCHIVE

The JHGC archive continues to grow and develop, with our collections of tangible and intangible archival material being catalogued and researched. Thanks to our dedicated volunteers, we have made great progress and are now researching items further and sharing new images and stories. Our collection is being digitised and recorded, making public access available. We have been at work cleaning and evaluating the objects in our permanent exhibition, and most of them are now available to explore on our online platform <u>E-Hive</u>, available globally. We have received interesting new donations ranging from family collections, to unique individual items, as well as testimonies – some of which are being recorded for the first time. We are constantly surprised by the interesting items that find their way to us, and the fascinating stories which are yet to be revealed.

We continue to explore the collection's interesting artefacts and stories in our popular **ArchiveFriday** series on social media, and look forward to sharing more in depth knowledge on our collections in the new year.

JULY

In July, the JHGC took a short break from public events. However, our education team was very busy this month working with schools and a range of community organisations.


One such organisation was **NextUp**, which supports learners to successfully bridge the transition from high school into post-school training and work. The organisation offers learners numerous opportunities to build their confidence, resilience, and experience in order to achieve and maintain fulfilling and successful lives. One such opportunity was to work with JHGC educators on a programme that equipped them with the knowledge and confidence to teach their peers, parents and community about the history of the Holocaust using JHGC pop up exhibitions guided and hosted in their own space.

With the generous support of the Rosa Luxemburg Stiftung (RLS) the JHGC was able to sponsor learner groups through **Rays of**Hope, an organisation partnering with the Alexandra community to create sustainable change through learning and development programmes and **Fight With Insight**, a thriving inner city community programme in the heart of Johannesburg.

The workshops explored genocide in the 20th century through the history of the Holocaust and the 1994 genocide in Rwanda. They included a discussion on identity, stereotyping and 'othering', a guided tour of our permanent exhibition spaces, and through New Dimensions in Testimony, a partnership with the USC Shoah Foundation, also an interactive conversation with Holocaust survivor Pinchas Gutter. Throughout the morning, learners were encouraged to make connections between the past and the present and to become active citizens in their own families, schools, and communities.

In July, members of the JHGC staff, Jordan Saltzman and Vix Appelbaum joined the Austrian Service Abroad students, staff from our sister Centres in Durban and Cape Town, and UCT students for a study seminar in Poland, led by Tali Nates. They visited many sites and had deep learning conversations with experts in the filed about Jewish life before the Holocaust, Holocaust history, memory and making connections to the present and future.

LEARNER FEEDBACK



AUGUST

The education team started August facilitating several hundred students from Eqinisweni Secondary School visiting in the first week of the month. The grade 9 students benefited from hearing about life experiences during the Holocaust, engaging with artefacts and photographs in the exhibition, and working in small groups.

We were privileged to host three international experts in Holocaust Education in August, Dr Yaron Nir Freisager, a history researcher specialising in Jewish ghettos writings in Poland during World War II, and the inaugural scholar in the Holocaust and Genocide studies fellowship by the JHGC, Hebrew University, and Sylt Foundation. We also hosted Sarah Levy, Educational Consultant, Overseas Education and Training Department at Yad Vashem. Additionally, we hosted Dr Tamir Hod, a historian in the field of World War II and the Holocaust, as well as the impact of Holocaust remembrance on Israeli society. Our guests shared their knowledge, experience and resources with the public, staff, volunteers, and educators.

In addition to a busy month for education, August started with a new exhibition in collaboration with the Sylt Foundation. *I see something you don't see* shows the work of Gil Shachar, an Israeli sculptor based in Germany. The exhibition highlights several of Shachar's thematic interests including questions concerning perception, illusion, invention, and the concept of "imagination". The exhibition had several walkabouts during August and will be open until the end of September.

As August was Women's Month, we hosted two events focusing on women. The first was by Dr Yaron Nir Freisager on women in the Holocaust which highlighted the unique positionality of women's experiences in the Holocaust. The second was a panel discussion in collaboration with the Nelson Mandela Museum in Mthatha. The panel looked at silent voices, the challenges of women in leadership, resillience during the Holocaust and 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda, and why we study difficult histories. The event created interesting dialogue between a range of people regarding women's experiences.





We had the privilege of hosting the Nelson Mandela Museum who held their Human Rights prize giving for learners from across the country at the JHGC. The Centre has also been buzzing with exciting events one of which was held by the Malka Ella fertility fund who had an art exhibition fundraiser. We ended August with the coming together of social workers and psychologist for an important workshop. We have had thousands of guests that we have hosted in the past few months and we look forward to welcoming more visitors to our beautiful space.

SEPTEMBER

In early September, we were involved in organising the 83rd commemoration and reunion of ex-detainees, who were deported in 1940 to Mauritius where they were held in prison by the British authorities for almost 5 years. The reunion included 38 ex-detainees and families (among them four who were born on the island), diplomats from Germany, Austria, Britain, and Israel, the Vice President of Mauritius, religious leaders and distinguished guests from Mauritius and around the world. The three-day events included a moving opening ceremony at the St. Martins' Jewish Cemetery where 126 Jewish detainees are buried, a visit to the Beau Bassin prison, to the Rose Hill Concert Hall where the detainees performed and to the Port Louis Harbour. It concluded with a meeting with the President of Mauritius and a closing ceremony at L'AMICALE Centre.

The event was organised by Tali Nates the director of the Johannesburg Holocaust & Genocide Centre, Dr. Roni Mikel-Arieli from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and Owen Griffiths the President of the Beau Bassin Jewish Detainees Memorial & Information Centre and with the support of the Rosa Luxemburg Foundation Southern Africa.

September has also seen the opening of our new exhibition, Chayela Rosenthal: Wunderkind of the Vilna Ghetto Theatre, produced by the Cape Town Holocaust & Genocide Centre. The exhibition focuses on Chayela Rosenthal, a remarkable talented performer who was one of the few survivors of the Vilna Ghetto who survived labour and concentration camps as well as a death march. After liberation, she gained recognition performing globally and settling in Cape Town. It will run until the end of the year. The opening was accompanied by a screening of the film **The Paper Brigade**, an award winning Belgian documentary, that tells the moving story of the resistance group "The Paper Brigade", a group of Jewish writers, scholars, and librarians who desperately tried to rescue Jewish cultural treasures in Vilna during the Nazi occupation.

Although the month has not yet ended, the JHGC has been busy in many different realms. School and group workshops, conferences, seminars and four Educator Training Workshops in Johannesburg and Limpopo supported by The Claims Conference were some of the other highlights of September.
